Tonight, we joyfully celebrate the 31st anniversary of the beloved CBST Community Chorus—a treasured ensemble comprised of CBST members—that has elevated our prayers and infused our services with incredible depth, energy, and soulfulness throughout the years. From its founding in 1994 under the direction of Music Director Joyce Rosenzweig, what began as a labor of love has flourished into one of the most respected synagogue choirs in the world. Time and again, chorus members have shared that singing in the chorus has been one of the most meaningful and joyous experiences of their lives. On this special Shabbat, we honor the chorus and Joyce's visionary leadership, with deep gratitude for the beauty and musical inspiration they continue to bring to our entire community! Mazal tov!

COMPOSER FEATURES

Elana Arian (born 1981) is one of the leading voices in contemporary Jewish music. A composer, multi-instrumentalist, and recording artist, Elana inspires communities across the country with her soulful songwriting and spirit. Elana has served on the faculty of both Shirei Chagiga in London and the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion in New York, working as a teaching artist in the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music. She has performed at Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Tanglewood, and perhaps most memorably, five separate appearances at the (Obama) White House. Elana lives with her wife, Cantor Julia Cadrain, and their two children.

Rita Glassman is an ordained Cantor, Board Certified Chaplain, and composer whose music fosters community, healing, and hope. A member of the Helfman Composers Group, her work is featured in Union for Reform Judaism anthologies. Rita has served congregations in New York, Marin County, and San Francisco. She has produced six CDs of original music, including *Begin Again: Songs of Hope and Renewal*. Her “Song for Peace,” which we will sing tonight, was performed at the White House for President and Michelle Obama in 2015. Known for her soulful voice, Rita’s music inspires transformation, joy, and peace. (adapted from ritaglassman.com)

Cantor Benjie Ellen Schiller (born 1958) joined Bet Am Shalom Synagogue in 1989, bringing spirited and heartfelt song and prayer to Shabbat and holiday services. Now Cantor Emerita, Cantor Schiller served as the Rabbi Lawrence A. Hoffman Professor of Liturgy, Worship, and Ritual and Professor of Cantorial Arts at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion’s Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music, where she shaped generations of cantors and clergy. A celebrated composer, her works include “Halleluhu,” a multi-rhythmic setting of Psalm 150, “Lamdeini,” “U’kratem D’ror – Proclaim Liberty,” written in response to 9/11, and a variety of commissioned pieces for choirs, synagogues, and interfaith groups. Her solo album, *A World Fulfilled*, was released in 2002, and her synagogue compositions were published in the 2019 collection *Azarah: Songs of Benjie Ellen Schiller* by Transcontinental Music. Recognized for her profound impact on Jewish music, Cantor Schiller received the “Hallel v’Zimrah” award from the Jewish Choral Foundation in 2019. She has also been a faculty member for the Institute for Jewish Spirituality’s rabbinic and cantorial programs and the North American Jewish Choral Festival, and is certified as a Jewish mindfulness meditation teacher, continuing to inspire through her teaching, compositions, and spiritual leadership.

A Blessing for Congregations Celebrating 50 Years of Women in the Cantorate

A Brief History of Women in the Cantorate

In 1975, just 50 short years ago, Barbara Ostfeld was ordained as the first female Cantor by the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. Prior to that, while there had been women serving as prayer leaders (zogerin), women singing and recording hazzanut, and even women who were given the professional title of Cantor, there had never been a woman ordained and recognized as a full member of the clergy.

According to accounts dating back to the 12th century, women have long used their voices to lead the Jewish people in prayer. While most remain nameless, the gravestone of Urania of Worms (d.1275), states she “chanted piyyutim (liturgical poems) and supplications for the women.”

Technological innovations over the last century have brought us recordings of such beloved Khazantes as Lady Cantor Madam Sophie Kurtzer (1896-1974), Jean Gornish (known as Shaindele di Khazante, 1915-1981), and Freydele Oysher (1913-2003). Their voices, and so many others, led the way for the women who would become Cantors after them.



Before the 1970s, women studying at HUC-JIR in the School of Sacred Music, now the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music, were preparing to serve in congregations as music teachers and choir directors. Following the 1972 ordination of Sally Preisand as the first female rabbi, the Reform Movement began to consider formal ordination of women Cantors.

Within just a few short years of Cantor Ostfeld's ordination, her impact was seen and heard. Many more women followed her into the ranks of the cantorate, changing the sound of Jewish music as they went. Throughout the 1980s and into the 1990s, women cantors greatly influenced the character of the profession and of Jewish American life in general. Cantors Vicki Axe and Judith Rowland were the first women presidents of the American Conference of Cantors (ACC), raising the female voice in leadership to a new level of significance.

Today, there are more women than men serving as Cantors of liberal congregations in the US. Adding women's voices to the cantorial canon has changed the sound of Jewish music and our Jewish community. Composers can now write new works for a variety of vocal ranges. Congregants can now see a full range of gender expressions on the bimah leading services. Indeed, the language of our liturgy now often reflects the inclusion not just of women, but also of those who identify as non-binary and trans. In reflecting upon her chosen profession Cantor Barbara Ostfeld wrote, "Women cantors have altered the way in which prayer is offered, heard, and received."

Prayer for the Return of the Hostages and for Peace

May there be no more death, no more senseless loss, for Israelis or Palestinians. May there be safety, justice, self-determination, hope, and a healthy future for all, b'karov u'v'yameinu, speedily, and in our days.
And let us say amen.
